Plenary: Encouraging Students to Speak

This session focuses on teaching speaking and promoting communication in English. We will first look at common teacher and learner challenges in speaking activities, identify what makes a good speaker and outline areas for improvement in terms of teaching methods. The session follows with practical teaching tips on how to encourage learners to be confident, fluent and accurate speakers of English, whilst making speaking tasks motivating, meaningful and balanced in terms of teacher support and learner challenges.

Workshop: Spice Up Your Lessons

In this practical, hands-on workshop we will look at ways to spice up everyday coursebook lessons through methods and activities that help motivate and enthuse teenage learners. The activities demonstrated in the workshop are versatile, and can be used in teaching both language and skills for all levels and abilities, with a view to making learning not just more fun, but also more productive.

Plenary: Sizzling grammar: Embracing change and teaching with spark!

Grammar never changes-or does it? Is it true to say that “the most difficult jobs in the World are language related jobs”? Following on from Professor David Crystal’s fascinating talk at IATEFL this year; we will briefly consider how and why grammar, vocabulary and spelling is changing so rapidly and then focus on how we can adapt as teachers to teach the essentials of grammar with renewed spark and vigour!

Workshop: Setting the limits in the ESL classroom; Managing behavior

This practical workshop will consider why students may misbehave in the ESL classroom and will also investigate the way in which teachers can begin to set limits and provide appropriate structure for the students which may help to encourage and promote more positive behavioural outcomes. We will also consider how teachers can try positive reinforcement, and other age-appropriate strategies and classroom management techniques that may be used to reduce teacher/child conflict.



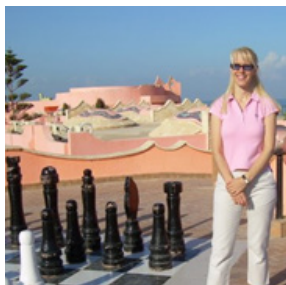
Biodata
